PHYSICS, ASSOCIATE IN SCIENCE FOR UC TRANSFER

This Associate in Science degree in Physics for UC Transfer degree is intended to facilitate transfer and increase academic preparation for students as they prepare to transfer into a Physics program at a UC campus. Along with the Transfer Agreement Guarantee (TAG), students completing this degree are guaranteed admission to the UC system, but not necessarily to a particular UC campus or major of their choice. Students should consult with a counselor for more information on university admission and transfer requirements, as this degree in Physics may not be the best option for students intending to transfer to a particular UC campus or to a college or university that is not part of the UC system.

To earn an Associate in Science in Physics for UC Transfer degree, students must:

- 1. Complete 40 semester units in Physics major preparation, as prescribed on the UCTP Template.
- 2. Complete IGETC* courses in the following areas, as prescribed on the UCTP Template.
 - a. Area 1A Freshman Composition (3 units)
 - b. Area 1B Critical Thinking (3 units)
 - c. Area 3 Arts and Humanities (3 units)
 - d. Area 4 Social and Behavioral Science (3 units)
 - e. Area 5B Biological Science (4 units)
 - f. Area 6 Language other than English (0-4 units)
- 3. Meet the specified requirements as stated in the Transfer Agreement Guarantee (TAG) for the available school.
- 4. Obtain a cumulative minimum grade point average (GPA) of 3.5 in the major. Students that earn less than 3.5 GPA (UC transferable) still meet the associate degree graduation requirement but will not receive the guaranteed admission into a UC.
- 5. Obtain a grade of "C" or better or "P" in all courses required in the major. Even though a "pass-no-pass" is allowed (Title 5 § 55063), it is highly recommended that students complete their major courses with a letter grade due to unit limitations on "P/NP" courses by the UC system.
- 6. Complete residency requirements. For students in the Ventura County Community College District, a minimum of 12 semester units must be completed in residence within the district.

*NOTE: This degree allows for the deferment of IGETC courses, including two courses in Area 3 (Arts and Humanities) and two courses in area 4 (Social Science). These deferred IGETC requirements are to be completed at the UC, after transfer.

- Appropriately utilize physics equipment and the skills needed to gather and analyze data.
- Extract information from graphs and utilize said information to draw conclusions.
- Interpret and develop diagrams depicting physical systems and use them to draw conclusions, formulate mathematical representations, and solve for unknown quantities.

• Utilize communication skills (e.g. written, oral, web-based) to effectively report observational results and conclusions based on these results.
